The biennial Award provides an opportunity for young Australian pianists to perform classical works and develop their recognition as professional artists.

It is an incredibly stimulating week of top-notch performances from an interesting and exciting repertoire.

Over the Award week in the lead up to the grand final and prize presentation, three adjudicators will listen intently and appraise every performance, while audiences can vote for their favourite pianist in the Lorna Speechley Memorial Prize for the People's Choice.

Australian National Piano Award

The Award showcases some of Australia's most brilliant and formidable emerging classical pianists.

Unlike some other piano competitions, no contestant can win the Award with just one impressive performance. Award finalists must professionally perform a range of solo recitals from classical masterpieces by Bach, Haydn, Schubert, Mozart, Beethoven and many other composers.

Acclaimed for its standard of international excellence, Award co-founders Max Cooke OAM and Darryl Coote designed the biennial Award over 30 years ago with an aim to reveal the natural artistic talent and technical mastery of young classical pianists.

Recognising the pursuit of professional excellence, technical brilliance and extraordinary flair, the Award is open to Australian and Australian-based pianists aged 21 to 35 years. It is a stepping stone to international piano competitions and solo music careers as a pianist.

The demands expected of the Award finalists are of international calibre. Past Award recipients are mature and sensitive artists who cultivate and embody great traditions to connect audiences with some of the supreme moments of classical piano composition.

Award adjudication

Prior to selecting and announcing the Award finalists, adjudicators review and assess a range of recordings supplied by applicants from across Australia.

During their week in Shepparton, each Award finalist will present two 45-minute solo recitals from a breadth of repertoire groups, which include:

- Baroque music up to and including Johann Sebastian Bach.
- Classic music after Bach, including the music of Ludwig van Beethoven and Franz Schubert.
- Romantic music from the 19th century up to 1900, but not including the music of Beethoven or Schubert.
- French impressionist music and 20th century music up to 1950.
- Music composed after 1950.
- An Australian classic work.

Throughout the Award process, adjudicators consider the range of technical mastery displayed as well as performance styles and characteristics; the knowledge and understanding of the national, historic and cultural context of the works presented; and that performance consistency is maintained across the chosen repertoire.

Award adjudicators will select five performers to play in the semi final and then three artists will compete in the grand final recital.

Following the grand final solo recitals, adjudicators will confirm and announce the Award recipients across a range of special prizes.

Award adjudicators also provide the finalists with a detailed personal appraisal and constructive criticism of their presentations as well as valuable advice for future music professional development.

Jayson Gillham United Kingdom / Australia



Internationally admired for his compelling performances and warm communicative style, Jayson Gillham is recognised as one of the finest pianists of his generation.

After receiving numerous prizes from leading piano competitions including the Leeds, Van Cliburn and Chopin competitions, it was Jayson's win at the 2014 Montreal International Music Competition that brought him to international attention.

Since 2015, Jayson has recorded a number of acclaimed solo albums for ABC Classic as well as the highly acclaimed live recordings of Beethoven Piano Concerto No 4 with the Sydney Symphony Orchestra and Vladimir Ashkenazy, Medtner and Rachmaninoff concertos with the Melbourne Symphony and Benjamin Northey.

Recent performance highlights include concerto engagements with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, City of Birmingham Symphony, Melbourne, Adelaide and Queensland Symphony Orchestras, Orchestre Symphonique de Montreal, Cape Town and Johannesburg Philharmonic Orchestras as well as solo recitals at Wigmore Hall, Louvre Auditorium, St Martinin-the-Fields and Oxford Piano Festival.

Jayson has adjudicated the Birmingham International Piano Competition, Royal Over-Seas League Annual Music Competition, BBC Young Musician of the Year and is delighted to return to Shepparton for the first time since receiving First Prize at the 2008 Australian National Piano Award

Associate Professor Rae de Lisle MNZM New Zealand



Formerly Head of Piano at the University of Auckland, Rae de Lisle is one of New Zealand's most sought-after piano teachers. Her teaching has supported many outstanding pianists who have excelled at international competitions, including first prizes at the Sydney International Piano Competition and the Lev Vlassenko Piano Competition.

Many of Rae's former students are established pianists throughout the world. In 2011, she received an Excellence in Teaching Award from the University of Auckland and was also awarded the Marie Vandewart Memorial Award for outstanding service and commitment to fostering the love of chamber music in New Zealand.

In 2015, she was made a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit for services to music.

Rae has presented her ground-breaking PhD research around the world. This research looks at a devastating musicians' injury called focal dystonia and has resulted in specific instrumental retraining concepts.

Rae's other lifetime research is focused on piano technique. She has developed an online course, Exploring Piano Technique and also published Fit 4 Piano, which includes exercises to develop and maintain healthy playing at all levels, from the beginner pianist to the most advanced. Her latest book, Fit 4 Piano Etudes, was commissioned with the support from Creative New Zealand and features works by 12 of New Zealand's most prominent composers

Rae has served as a jury member for a number of prestigious international piano competitions, including the Dublin International Piano Competition, the Gina Bachauer Young Artists Piano Competition and the Singapore National Piano Competition.

Doctor Tamara Smolyar Australia



Born to a family of four generations of musicians, Tamara Smolyar is an internationally acclaimed, multi-award-winning pianist, chamber musician and pedagogue representing the finest traditions of the Russian Piano School.

Tamara has received a Bachelor of Music with Honours from the Kiev State Conservatorium of Music in the Ukraine, a Masters degree from the University of Melbourne and a Doctorate of Philosophy (Music Performance) from Monash University.

A number of composers have written music for Tamara as a soloist and a chamber musician. She has made numerous radio and television recordings for national and international broadcasters, commercial recordings with Cantor Productions, Move Records, Schimmel International Artists Collection, Vox Australis and Toccata Classics.

Working at many prominent venues across the globe, Tamara has conducted many masterclasses, adjudicated piano competitions and performed a variety of concerto, chambermusic and solo recitals.

As a respected pedagogue with a vast scope of the piano literature, Tamara instils a solid technique and develops musicians to aim for high levels of music performance. Many past students under her tutelage were recipients of national and international piano competitions.

Tamara is currently a Piano staff member at the Melbourne Conservatorium of Music. She was previously a Senior Lecturer and Coordinator of Piano for 25 years at the Sir Zelman Cowen School of Music and Performance at Monash University.

2024 Award finalists



Calvin Abdiel 23 years old from New South Wales



Calvin Abdiel is completing a Master of Arts at Hochschule für Musik Hanns Eisler Berlin with Professor Eldar Nebolsin. He has received a Bachelor of Music (Performance) with First Class Honours at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music, where he was taught by Natalia Ricci.

Born in Jakarta and now based in Sydney, Calvin was the youngest pianist in the 2021 Sydney International Piano Competition and the only Australian to reach the final. He received the George Frederick Boyle Third Prize, the Nancy Weir Best Australian Pianist Award and an overseas scholarship to further his career. During 2022, he had an Australian debut recital tour across New South Wales, Victoria and the Australian Capital Territory.

Calvin has received many international accolades, including third prize at the 2024 International Piano Competition Mauro Paolo Monopoli Prize in Italy, first prize at the 2020 Ananda Sukarlan Award in Indonesian and second prize and other awards at the 2018 Piano Val de Travers 2018 in Switzerland.

In 2017, Calvin made his orchestral debut with the St. Petersburg State Capella Symphony Orchestra. He has also performed with the Queensland Symphony Orchestra, Sydney Conservatorium Symphony Orchestra, G20 Orchestra, Orchestra ICO Suoni del Sud and Les Chambrites.

Calvin has collaborated with a range of conductors, including Anatoly Rybalko, Gerard Schwarz, Richard Davis, Roger Benedict and Benedetto Montebello. As a chamber musician, he performed at the 2021 Canberra International Music Festival and 2023 Out West Piano Fest.

Jiaqi Cheng has a Bachelor and Master of Music from the Manhattan School of Music and received a Licentiate of Music, Australia (LMusA) and Associate of Music, Australia (AMusA) from the Australian Music Examinations Board.

Currently residing in Sydney, Jiaqi is a professional concert pianist who has received numerous national and international accolades and scholarships. He also teaches piano and performs solo recitals, chamber music and other collaborative projects.

Over the years, Jiaqi has developed as a musician under the guidance of Clemens Leske, William Wolfram and the late Phillip Kawin. He has also collaborated with Marc Silverman, Alexander Korsantia, Ignat Solzhenitsyn, Matti Raekallio, Heasook Rhee and Phillip Shovk.

Jiaqi has performed at venues across Australia, America, the United Kingdom and China, including the Sydney Opera House, Sydney Town Hall, Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall and The Riverside Church in New York.

Committed to music education, community engagement and pedagogical research, Jiaqi led a sold-out series of Rachmaninoff Piano Concerto Marathon performances across Australia in 2023 in honour of the composer's 150th anniversary.

Michael de Huy is completing a Bachelor of Music (Performance) as an Honours student at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music under Natalia Ricci.

A Chinese Vietnamese pianist born in Melbourne, Michael started piano studies at the age of four where he studied with Anatoly Dokumentov and later continued studying at Victorian College of the Arts Secondary School with Glenn Riddle.'

Michael is an improviser, arranger and composer who has received numerous prizes. This includes first prize at the 2023 Valencia International Piano Festival Competition and the 2023 Sydney Conservatorium of Music Piano Concerto Competition as well as joint-recipient for the 2023 Theme & Variations Foundation Award.

Scholarships received from the Sydney Conservatorium of Music and St Andrew's College at University of Sydney has allowed Michael to attend music programs and masterclasses across Europe for over two years. During this time he studied with Marta Zabaleta, Sergei Edelmann, Jacques Rouvier, Paul Roberts and Pavel Nersessian.

Michael often intertwines improvisation and original composition in solo piano recitals, including for the Inspire Music Aust 2023 tour throughout regional New South Wales.

Earlier this year, Michael performed Maurice Ravel's Piano Concerto Piano Concerto with the Sydney Conservatorium of Music Symphony Orchestra, where he played an original improvised arrangement as an encore.

Joshua Han 22 years old from New South Wales



Joshua Han is studying piano performance with Dr Paul Rickard-Ford from the Sydney Conservatorium of Music. He is a regular piano performer and enjoys engaging in chamber music and accompaniment.

An Australian-born pianist, Joshua started piano studies at the age of four and received his Licentiate of Music, Australia (LMusA) at the age of 10.

After receiving his first gold in the Sydney Eisteddfod at the age of six, Joshua went on to achieve considerable success in music, including numerous international and national prizes, orchestra collaborations and solo performances across four continents.

Joshua received first prize at the 2014 Ettlingen International Piano Competition in Germany, where he achieved the highest mark at the time in the competition's 28-year history.

In 2015, Joshua received first prize and audience prize at the Aarhus International Piano Competition in Denmark and in 2016, he received a Fellowship Recital Diploma at the age of 14, which was the beginning of several years of piano performance.

In 2022, Joshua received second prize and audience prize in the National Section of the Australian Youth Classical Music Competition and first prize in the New South Wales Division of the 2MBS Fine Music Young Virtuoso Awards.

At the 2024 Lev Vlassenko Piano Competition, Joshua was the second prize recipient and also received the Concerto Prize, Queensland Symphony Orchestra Musicians Prize and the Dr Graeme Russell Virtuoso Study Prize. Recently, he was the inaugural recipient of the 2024 John Lamble Helping Hand Grant to support a creative project for aspiring musicians.

Aside from classical music, Joshua also performs popular music. He and his brother made the Australia's Got Talent 2013 grand final with a rendition of Pirates of the Caribbean.
